Question: The question I have relates to the carrying capacity and how it compares to the maximum demand. Is it scalable so that you can accommodate the maximum demand if this becomes a frequently used mode of transportation?

LASRE response: The Redline currently carries about 3,000 passengers per hour per direction. The Redline is the most used line in the Metro system currently. Metro ridership forecasting is estimating that the Sepulveda line will have 3,000 passengers per hour per direction. Our capacity on the first day of operation with a four-car train set is 12,000 passengers per hour per direction. We will have the ability on the first day of operation to have an 8-car train set, that would allow us to carry 24,000 per hour per direction.

Question: Do we have monorails in other parts of the US?

LASRE response: The United States does have monorails. The first version of monorails are used at Disneyland and there is a monorail at the Seattle airport. The monorail that we are proposing is a modern monorail used for mass transit.

Question: Where else might you target for projects like this? What other freeways?

LASRE response: This is a decision that Metro would have to make.
